

The PA Autism Census Update, conducted by the Autism Services, Education, Resources, & Training Collaborative (ASERT), provides a count of the number of individuals with autism who are receiving services in Pennsylvania. It identifies where these individuals live and which systems are supporting them. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) tracks the national autism prevalence using population surveillance. We have included the estimate of the number of individuals in this county based on CDC prevalence rates to compare to the number of individuals receiving services in PA identified by the PA Autism Census. This information can be a powerful tool to help you, your family, decision-makers, and others in your local community to understand autism in Pennsylvania by highlighting where and how individuals with autism are receiving services.

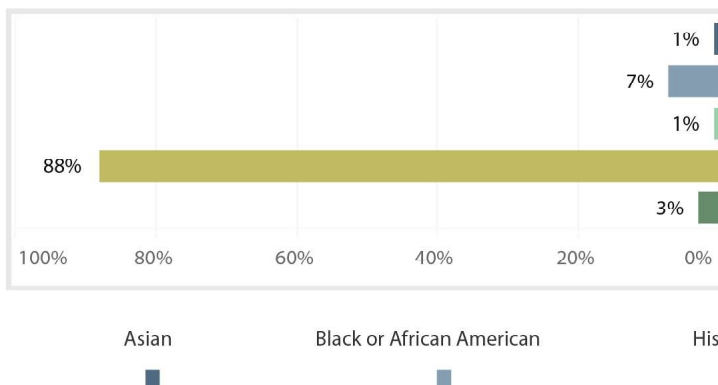

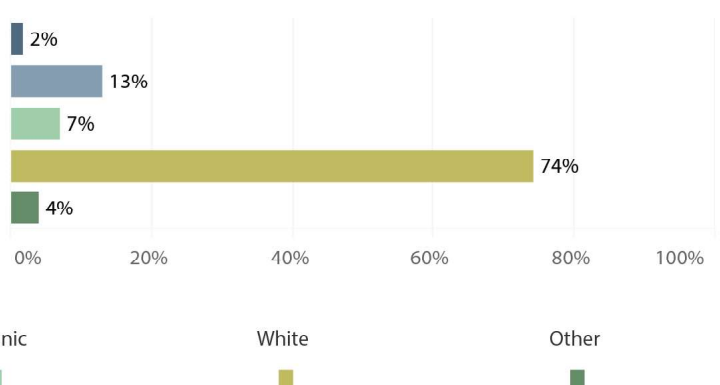

Lycoming County



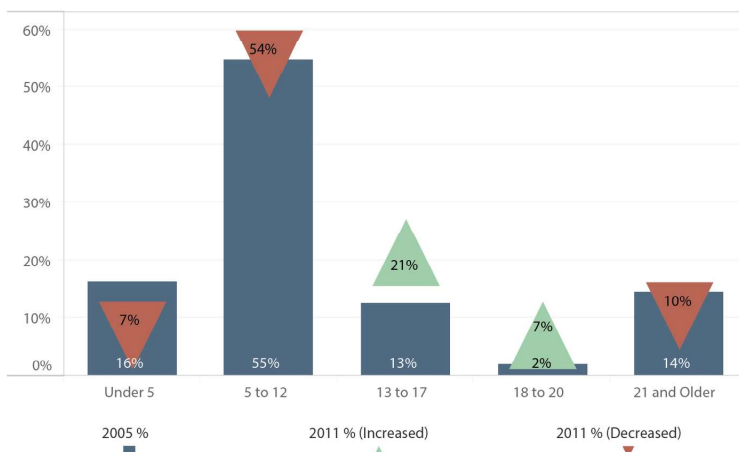

What does this mean?

In Lycoming County, most individuals with autism receiving services were White (88%). A smaller proportion of individuals with autism receiving services in Lycoming County were Black or African American (7%), Hispanic (1%), Other (3%), or Asian (1%) when compared to the rest of Pennsylvania.

What does this mean?

In Lycoming County, the majority of individuals with ASD are between the ages of 5 and 17. However, there was a drastic increase in individuals aged 13-17 and 18-20 years old who will soon be aging into the adult systems of care.
