3. Read sacred texts

Every religion has a special book or set of teachings for its followers to learn from. Some examples are the Bible, the Torah, or the Vedas. Reading these religious writings may help you understand the history and the main ideas of that religion.

4. Use online resources

The internet can help you learn about different religions. Look for websites that end in .gov, .edu, or .org. These sites have information that has usually been checked to make sure it is correct.

5. Ask questions

The best way to learn about a religion is to ask questions. Talk to religious leaders and people who practice that religion. Ask them why they chose to follow it and how it helps them in their life.
